D. Adopt Capital Project Ordinance Amendments 92-9, 92-10, and 92-11.

Capital Project Ordinance Amendment 92-9

The City has entered into a service agreement with Concurrent Computer Corporation to provide maintenance for the Digital Traffic System. The service charges of the agreement total \$6,348. The costs of the Service agreement will be shared by the NCDOT (\$5,459 or 86%) and City (\$889 or 14%). This ordinance amendment appropriates NCDOT's share of the costs. The City's share will not require an additional appropriation as current project funds will be utilized.

Capital Project Ordinance Amendment 92-10

The Parks and Recreation Department has received additional owner contributions to the Street Releaf program in the amount of \$1,380. This ordinance appropriates those additional receipts.

Capital Project Ordinance Amendment 92-11

The City has received from the NCDOT a funding authorization to proceed with the replacement of the Winslow Street bridge totaling \$501,202. This ordinance amendment appropriates additional funds as required to reflect the funding authorization.

E. Adopt Capital Project Ordinance Partial Closeouts 92-6, 92-7, and 92-8.

The purpose of these partial closeouts is to remove obsolete records which represent the completion of various phases in the respective projects. The total budget and financial activity to be removed represent the total expenditures as of June 30, 1991, as audited by the City's independent auditors, Cherry, Bekaert & Holland.

F. Adopt Capital Project Ordinance Closeouts 92-2, 92-3, 92-4, and 92-5.

Capital Project Ordinance Closeout 92-2

The Parks and Recreation Department has completed the Park Improvement Projects which were initially approved by Council on June 22, 1987. The projects involved improvement of facilities located at the Honeycutt, Seabrook, Spivey, Edgewood/Tokay, Massey Hill and North Street recreation centers; construction of the Clark Park Nature Center and Rowan Street Park band shell platform; and improvements to facilities at the Mazarick and College Lakes parks. This ordinance will recognize the completion of these projects and authorize the removal of project expenditures from the City's accounting records.

Capital Project Ordinance Closeout 92-3

The Parks and Recreation Department has received the completed design work and documents for the Downtown Linear Park. The purpose of the project was to provide preliminary design for the Downtown Linear Park and final design and construction documents for Phase One development of the park. This ordinance will recognize the completion of this project and authorize the removal of project expenditures from the City's accounting records.

Capital Project Ordinance Closeout 92-4

The Community Development Department has completed the 14th program year rental rehabilitation project. During the course of the project the City's rental rehabilitation received bonus funding from HUD in the amounts of \$32,000 and \$60,000. In both cases HUD indicated the bonuses were ". . . the result of the excellent manner in which the Program has been administered and the timely use of Rental Rehabilitation funds." This ordinance will recognize the completion of this project and authorize the removal of project expenditures from the City's accounting records.

G. Adopt Special Revenue Fund Project Ordinance 92-1 and 92-2.

Special Revenue Fund Project Ordinance 92-1

The Fayetteville Police Department has received additional Federal Forfeiture funds totaling \$61,604. This ordinance appropriates these additional receipts.

Special Revenue Fund Project Ordinance 92-2

The Fayetteville Police Department has requested and received a grant in the amount of \$3,200 from the Florence Rogers Charitable Trust. The purpose of the grant is to provide an early intervention project in the form of Judo classes for at-risk youths in low-income housing communities under the auspices of the Police Athletic League (PAL). This ordinance establishes the necessary accounts to record program expenditures.

#### 3. Public Hearings:

Mayor Dawkins read the policy on the time limit for public hearings and non-public hearings.

A. Consideration of designation of John A. Oates House as historic property. (Joint public hearing with Historic Resources Commission)

Mayor Dawkins announced this was a joint public hearing with the Historic Resources Commission. Councilmember Bolton raised a question as to whether a quorum of the Historic Resources Commission would be required. After discussion with City Attorney Robert Cogswell, the hearing moved forward.

The public hearing opened at 7:11 p.m. Wayne McGary, Chair of the Historic Resources Commission, stated the Commission felt the John A. Oates House was of sufficient historic and architectural value, that it should be placed on the Historic Register.

There was none to speak in opposition to this designation. The public hearing was closed at 7:13 p.m.

Councilmember Bolton moved to approve the designation of the John A. Oates House as historic property and to adopt the foregoing ordinance. The motion was seconded by Councilmember Kendrick and carried unanimously 8 to 0.

This item was presented by Al Mitchell, Assistant City/County Planning Director. The Planning Board recommended approval of this special use permit with the requirement that the standard noise, smoke, and odor regulations be maintained at all times pursuant to Section 32-35 of the Fayetteville Code of Ordinances. Mr. Mitchell told Council they must make a finding that this action would not be detrimental to public safety, health, or welfare.

The public hearing was opened at 7:15 p.m. There were none to speak in favor or opposition to this matter, and it was closed at 7:16 p.m.

CITY ESTIMATE

Consideration of request from George Yourgal to appear before City Council regarding McFayden Lake.

Mr. George Yourgal, 5577 Nix Road, Fayetteville, North Carolina, addressed the Council and solicited their help in getting the state of North Carolina to delay the draining of getting the state of North Carolina to delay the draining of McFayden Lake. This action by the state is to be taken because of an unsafe dam, which is owned by Dr. Saliba and the De LaFayette Restaurant. Mr. Yourgal stated that the lake contains approximately 70 acres and would become a health hazard to the community if drained. He stated the property value of the owners of the property around the lake would be decreased as a result of this action. The approximate cost to decreased as a result of this action. The approximate cost to repair the dam could be between \$500,000 to \$700,000 according to Mr. Yourgal. Councilmember McBryde raised the issue of the City's liability if something should happen to the dam during the delay time. Mr. Smith, City Manager, addressed the Council and suggested they instruct the staff to investigate the situation.

Councilmember Evans made a motion that the City staff check into the situation and contact the state on behalf of the City and the property owners surrounding McFayden Lake, seconded by Councilmember Kendrick and passed unanimously 8 to 0.

6. Report from Streets and Roads Committee.

City Manager John Smith presented the report. He recommended the Council approve the six recommendations of the Committee and instruct the staff to prepare the ordinance for further consideration.

Mr. Smith reported the second issue discussed was impact fees. The staff will be bringing a proposed consultant contract to City Council on this matter in the near future.

Mr. Smith further reported that a meeting was scheduled with a development group and citizens for further discussion of the proposed street standards.

Councilmember Kendrick stated the data did not support the installation of a traffic signal at the intersection of Commerce and Robeson Streets.

Councilmember Kendrick moved to have staff draft ordinances for presentation to the City Council, seconded by Councilmember Torrey and carried unanimously 8 to 0. The approved items are as follows:

- The City adopt the state Commercial weight limits for City streets (GS 20-118).
- The City establish a new "Light-truck" traffic schedule with a 13,000 pound/axle limit. Streets with observed pavement failures can be added to this schedule as necessary.
- 3. That non-truck route streets with reported and observed cut-thru truck traffic problems be posted with "No Thru Trucks" signs to assist with enforcement.
- 4. That a permit/bonding procedure be developed that would establish haul routes for construction traffic on local streets, require a pavement inspection before and after construction activities, and bond the contractor for repair of streets damaged by construction traffic.
- 5. That the Police Department either develop weight limit enforcement capabilities or coordinate enforcement with the North Carolina Department of Motor Vehicles.
- 6. That residential collector street pavement be constructed to minor thoroughfare standards to accommodate anticipated heavy commercial traffic.
- 7. Consideration of request from Councilmember Ida Ross for discussion of naming a street in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Councilmember Ida Ross expressed to the Council her concerns regarding the naming of a City street for Martin Luther King, Jr. She feels that the City is making history by its inaction and that something should be done about the situation. Councilmember Ross stated that Councilmember Bolton had spoken to her about the possibility of a park being named in honor of Mr. King, and now she would like to know what the other Councilmembers want to do.

Councilmember Torrey stated he felt that Fayetteville should follow the path of other communities that have named a street or road after Dr. King. This action would be in line with the new City logo and would enhance the image of the City of Fayetteville. Mr. Torrey suggested Murchison Road be changed to Martin Luther King, Jr., Highway/Boulevard.

Councilmember Evans stated she would like for the record to show that the City Council thought Dr. King was a great and good man and that he died for what he believed in.

Councilmember Pillow expressed his concern about taking away a street name already associated with the minorities in Fayetteville. He suggested a study be done to designate the streets that would qualify for a name change. He did not feel the CBD Loop was appropriate. He also stated he was opposed to changing a street name that was done in honor of another person.

Councilmember Torrey made a motion that the name of Murchison Road be changed to Martin Luther King, Jr., Expressway/Boulevard/Drive, seconded by Councilmember Ross.

Councilmember Evans stated that a survey should be made of the inhabitants to see if they were in agreement because a survey had always been done when a name change was involved. Councilmember Evans offered a friendly amendment to Mr. Torrey's motion that if a majority of property owners were in favor of the change, then it should be done.

John Smith, City Manager, informed Council that their policy regarding name changes in streets calls for a public hearing. This was not by ordinance and the policy could be changed by them if they so desired.

Councilmember Kendrick stated he did not want to do a survey which was expensive to the taxpayers. He thought we should hold a public hearing on the matter.

Councilmember Suzan Cheek arrived at the meeting at 7:46~p.m.

A discussion ensued regarding the public hearing question. After determining that it would take 30 days or longer to give proper notices, Councilmember McBryde questioned the motion on the floor. He asked for clarification as to whether the motion changed the name immediately or would a survey be done with the findings being brought back to the City Council for a decision regarding renaming of the street.

Councilmember Evans made a substitute motion to have a survey done of property owners and then have the issue brought back to City Council, seconded by Councilmember Bolton.

Councilmember McBryde asked if a public hearing would be required. Councilmember Cheek asked for clarification as to whether a survey would be of the occupants or property owners. She expressed her preference for a public hearing rather than a survey. At this point Councilmember Bolton withdrew his second to the substitute motion made by Councilmember Evans. Mayor Dawkins called for a second to Councilmember Evans' motion. No second was heard. The substitute motion died for lack of a second.

Councilmember Kendrick stated he was for a public hearing and not a survey. A discussion of the status of Councilmember Torrey's motion and Councilmember Evans' friendly amendment followed. The restated motion was that Murchison Road would be renamed Martin Luther King after a survey of property owners had been conducted and the results brought back to City Council for final action. Mayor Dawkins called for a vote on the motion/friendly amendment.

The motion was defeated by a vote of 6 to 3. Councilmembers Torrey, Ross, and Evans voted for the motion and Councilmembers Cheek, Robertson, Kendrick, Pillow, McBryde, and Bolton voted against the motion.

Councilmember Pillow made a motion requesting the staff to meet with the Planning Department and compile a list of streets that could be named after Martin Luther King, Jr. Councilmember Cheek asked Mr. Pillow to state the criteria to be considered in the selection of these streets. Mr. Pillow replied that it should be a street with high visibility

throughout the City and not contained to just a minority neighborhood. Mr. Pillow's motion was seconded by Councilmember Robertson and passed unanimously 9 to 0.

8. Consideration of request for legal representation.

City Attorney Robert Cogswell presented this item. He stated that William H. Simons was requesting James R. Nance be hired to represent him at a rate of \$100 per hour. Also, Tom Guilette had requested that William (Billy) Richardson be retained for him at a rate of \$90 per hour. Councilmember McBryde moved that Attorneys Nance and Richardson be appointed as requested, seconded by Councilmember Cheek and carried unanimously 9 to 0.

- 9. Appointments:
- A. Nominations to fill one vacancy on Appearance Commission.

There were no nominations to fill the vacancy on the Appearance Commission.

B. Nominations to fill one vacancy on Wrecker Review Board.

The Council voted unanimously 9 to 0 to place Bill Mauldin as Chairman on the Wrecker Review Board.

- 10. Administrative Reports:
- A. Statement of taxes collected for the month of December 1991 from the Cumberland County Tax Collector.

The total amount collected for December 1991 was \$5,905,592.63.

B. Report of disposal of surplus property.

The list of surplus property is attached to and made a part of these minutes.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 8:12 p.m. upon motion and second.


Mayor Dawkins called the meeting order and recognized Reverend Sandy Saunders for the invocation. Mayor Dawkins then led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag.

Upon motion by Councilmember McBryde, seconded by Councilmember Kendrick, Council voted unanimously to approve the agenda.

Mayor Dawkins then recognized the Co-Chairmen of the Mayor's Task Force on Drugs in Our Community, Reverend Sandy Saunders and Mrs. Lois Moses, for a presentation of the Task Force Report. Reverend Saunders and Mrs. Moses reviewed the task of the Committee and summarized the recommendations. Upon motion by Councilmember Bolton, seconded by Councilmember McBryde, Council voted unanimously to accept the Task Force Report. Upon motion by Councilmember Bolton, seconded by Councilmember McBryde, Council voted unanimously to direct the City Manager to immediately implement Recommendation No. 3, to direct the City Attorney to develop the resolutions identified in Recommendations 4, 5, and 6 for action by City Council at their next meeting, and to refer the other nine (9) recommendations to staff for an immediate return to Council with staff evaluation and recommendations. Mayor Dawkins then presented certificates of appreciation to all members of the Task Force.

City Manager John Smith gave Council a preliminary estimate of the cost for each recommendation of the Task Force. He stated that these were preliminary requests by the Department Heads and had not been reviewed by the Manager or placed in any priority order. Upon motion by Councilmember Cheek, seconded by Mayor Pro-Tem Evans, Council voted unanimously to commit to the implementation of Recommendation No. 7 (mounted/neighborhood foot patrol officers) and requested the staff to return to Council at the next meeting with a specific plan and cost for this implementation. Councilmember Kendrick asked that the staff review of all recommendations include a time for implementation.

Council next heard from Pamela R. M. Alkins who expressed her concerns about the imposition of a curfew.



Next item was the presentation of a change in the operation of the Farmer's Market by Assistant City Manager Roger Stancil. Mr. Stancil explained the proposed contract between the County and the Women's Center for management of the Farmer's Market. He stated it is the staff's opinion that this contract does not affect the interlocal agreement between the County and the City regarding the Farmer's Market and that the County would continue to reimburse the City for utilities.

Scott Loehr, Curator of the Museum of the Cape Fear, presented plans for the Museum of the Cape Fear Historical Complex and the current effort to reconstruct the northwest tower of the North Carolina Arsenal. He was assisted in this presentation by Mr. Reggie Barton of the Museum of the Cape Fear Board of Advisors.

Assistant City Manager Roger Stancil then presented an update on the Market House Restoration Project. He stated that the City had approached Fayetteville Technical Community College to seek their assistance in completing the restoration. Agreements had been signed with FTCC under which the City will provide materials and FTCC will provide student labor for this project. The current estimates are that this will allow the exterior restoration of the Market House to be completed within funds already appropriated.

City Manager John Smith provided information to Council in preparation for deliberations on the 1992-93 budget. His presentation included a review and projection of revenues and expenditures and a status of fund balance. He also discussed his plan to evaluate 10 percent of the City's programs each year for the next 5 years in order to establish a more logical process for the allocation of resources.

City Manager John Smith then presented an update on the status of demolition of 17 downtown buildings.

The City Manager then presented a status report on street improvement projects currently underway. Councilmember Cheek asked for a more complete schedule on the McPherson Church Road/Morganton Road project.

Upon motion by Councilmember Robertson, seconded by Councilmember Kendrick, Council voted unanimously to adjourn.

# FAYETTEVILLE REGIONAL AIRPORT SUPPLEMENTAL AGREEMENT NO. 2

# CITY OF FAYETTEVILLE, NORTH CAROLINA AND WILBUR SMITH ASSOCIATES

On January 6, 1992, the City of Fayetteville, North Carolina (OWNER) and Wilbur Smith Associates (ENGINEER) entered into an agreement (BASIC AGREEMENT) for professional services relating to the improvement and development of Fayetteville Regional Airport. The BASIC AGREEMENT outlined the type of work included with the improvement plan for the airport and the Scope of Services which the ENGINEER will provide for the OWNER. The BASIC AGREEMENT did not include any specific work element schedule or payment for such services since it is anticipated that the improvement projects will be staged over a several year period. All specific work is to be authorized and conducted under Supplemental Agreements to the BASIC AGREEMENT.

This Supplemental Agreement Number 2 is to authorize ENGINEER to provide a Comprehensive Master Plan and Air Service Study. Work Scope elements are more defined in Attachment A of this Supplemental Agreement. This Supplemental Agreement shall remain in effect for the same duration as the BASIC AGREEMENT.

## Schedule

ENGINEER shall perform work as authorized by OWNER in a timely manner and as agreed by both parties prior to the start of this work effort. For budgeting purposes, it is estimated that all work can be completed within 6 - 8 months not including federal review time.

## **Payment**

OWNER agrees to pay the ENGINEER a Lump Sum fee for services rendered under this Supplemental Agreement Number 2 in an amount of One Hundred Thirty-Five Thousand Twenty and no/100 (\$135,020.00) Dollars.

ENGINEER shall make periodic requests for payment based on a percentage of work completed. Payment will be made on such periodic basis subject to OWNER's concurrence with the amount of work completed and percent of fee requested.

    - Federal Aviation Administration Southern Region Airports District Office

Task Product - The Consultant will provide aviation forecasts of enplanements and operations of air carrier/commuter activity plus general aviation activity.

# TASK C - AIR SERVICE STUDY

Objective - During the first phases of airline deregulation, the explosion of new entrant carriers and the race to establish market position was very positive for many communities and air passengers. More recently, consolidation within the industry, rapid deployment of airline resources to gain access to international markets, and the recession has forced air carriers to take a close look at which markets they serve, fare levels and aircraft deployment. It is incumbent upon communities to also examine their own air service to determine if it, in fact, meets the demands of the local market.

The air service study will address key issues facing Fayetteville:

- Appropriate mix of service, aircraft and frequency to match travel patterns in the Fayetteville market.
- Leakage of passengers who depart from alternate airports such as Raleigh-Durham.
- Fayetteville's competitive position vis-a-vis other nearby airports.
  - Fares
  - Service.
- Passenger service improvements
  - New single plane service options
  - Larger aircraft potential

- Cargo improvements and new opportunities.
- Effective strategies for change.

### A. Definition of Air Service Area

Objective - Determine the geographic area that the airport serves.

Method - To define the Fayetteville Air Service Area, three measures of market reach will be used:

- 1) Standard FAA definitions of hub market areas;
- 2) Passenger survey to determine the travel patterns of originating passengers at Fayetteville;
- 3) Interviews with a selected group of travel agent to establish the reach of the market.

<u>Product</u> - Geographic description of the Fayetteville market area and profile of passengers departing from the airport.

## B. Analysis of Local Economic and Demographic Conditions

<u>Objective</u> - Develop a socioeconomic database which describes the characteristics of the local economy and potential for growth.

<u>Method</u> - The Consultant will prepare a profile of the Fayetteville air service market area which will examine:

- Demographic characteristics
- Income growth
- Key industries and employment patterns
- Other measures of economic activity.

<u>Product</u> - Detailed profile of the region and discussion of the factors that will influence the growth of air travel and air cargo.

### C. Analysis of the Market for Air Service

<u>Objective</u> - Describe the characteristics of the air travel market, including those passengers departing from other nearby airports.

<u>Method</u> - The Consultant will conduct two surveys as part of the air service analysis:

- 1. Ticket Sample Survey
- 2. Survey of Airport Passengers using Fayetteville Regional Airport.

Results from the surveys will be used to estimate the size of the Fayetteville air service market, identify major travel destinations, and confirm patterns of airport use. Survey results will be tabulated to produce the following types of information:

- Airport Origination Patterns
  - Fayetteville
  - Raleigh-Durham
  - Charlotte
- Prospects for Increased Market Catchment
- Major Markets by Origin Airport
- Average Fares Paid by Market
- Connecting Hub Patterns
- Travel Patterns
  - Business Travel
  - Discretionary Travel
- Airport Preferences & Problems

Using survey results and information available from the airport and the U.S. Department of Transportation, the Consultant will analyze the market for air service and prepare a set of air service recommendations. The analysis of the market will consist of the following components:

- Top Origin & Destination Markets
- History of Service
- Traffic Trends
- Analysis of Schedules, Service and Capacity by Carrier
- Comparison of Connecting Opportunities at Hub Airports
- Analysis of commuter and air carrier type aircraft
- Estimate of Market Potential
- Average Fares by Market

<u>Project</u> - Detailed analysis of Fayetteville's air service market and discussion of potential improvements to air service.

## D. Cargo Market Evaluation

<u>Objectives</u> - To evaluate the market for air cargo, provide input into Master Plan cargo forecasts and future space needs, and prepare a strategy to improve and increase cargo operations at Fayetteville.

## Method - The following tasks will be completed:

- Analyze historical and forecast business development in the region with particular attention to those SIC (Standard Industrial Classification) industries which have high air freight potential.
- Analyze cargo trends for Fayetteville and airports that might compete with Fayetteville for cargo.
- Prepare a survey questionnaire and list of key companies and individuals to interview.
- Survey current and prospective cargo facility users. This includes combination airlines, all-cargo and small package operators, forwarders, ground handling agents, brokers, truckers, U.S. Customs, U.S. Postal Service and other potential cargo facility users.

<u>Product</u> - Detailed analysis of Fayetteville's air cargo market and report of survey findings.

## E. Recommendations for Service Improvements: Passenger and Cargo

<u>Objective</u> - To prepare a set of concrete recommendations for improvements in passenger services and air cargo operations.

<u>Method</u> - The Consultant will make recommendations for service improvements. These recommendations may include:

- New Service Opportunities
- Other Service & Fare Improvements
  - Schedule Improvements
  - Added Frequency
  - Change of Aircraft
  - Competitive Fares
- Target Carriers/New Cargo Opportunities

<u>Product</u> - Discussion of recommendations for consideration by Fayetteville Regional Airport.

## F. Strategy - Next Steps

Objective - Provide a framework for future air passenger and cargo marketing activity undertaken by the Fayetteville Regional Airport.

Method - The Consultant will outline a marketing plan, budget, organization and required steps needed to achieve recommended service improvements.

Product - Action Plan.

## TASK 4 - DEMAND/CAPACITY ANALYSIS

Objective - Detailed analyses regarding existing airfield capacities will be determined by the Consultant.

Terminal Building Capacity - The existing terminal building capacity.

Ticketing areas

Baggage claim

- Concession areas

Make-up/Break-down areas

Public concourse

Airline operations areas

Passenger hold areas

Administrative facilities

- Commuter and air carrier service areas in concourses A and B.
- Airfield Capacity An analysis of the rate of aircraft movements, runway length as an inhibiting factor for certain aircraft types, and level of delay for aviation operations will be determined.
- F.B.O. Building Area Capacity Evaluation of Fixed Based Operations and other building facilities will include capacity analysis of general aviation apron area, passenger and infrastructure areas, cargo facilities, hangars, and automobile parking space.
- Runways Utilization The effect of aviation activity in terms of prevailing winds relative to the airport's runway system.
- Airspace and Airfield Capacity Proximity of runway and taxiway alignments and nature of operations will be determined as part of this work effort.
- Airport Access Capacity Access capacity for the airport will be determined by relating the number of people and vehicle movements with the facilities available for providing these movements.

<u>Task Product</u> - The Consultant will determine capacity constraints for various airport elements.

## TASK 5 - FACILITIES REQUIREMENTS

<u>Objective</u> - The Consultant will prepare an analysis of the facilities needs of Fayetteville Regional Airport and devise an expedient/cost effective program to accommodate the needs.

Facility requirements will be determined based on the forecasts. The demand/capacity analysis prepared in the previous section will be used to help in the assessment of the facilities required to serve the aviation needs of the Fayetteville Regional Airport.

### Air Carrier/Commuter

 Air carrier/commuter requirements will be based on enplanement and operating forecasts. Requirements shall include building size, general space requirements per activity, curbside and apron.

### **General Aviation**

 General aviation facility requirements estimates will be based on the demand/capacity analysis and established or developed planning criteria.
 Requirements shall include open tie down, hangar space, Fixed Based Operations building space, corporate hangar facilities, terminal spaces, and locations.

### **Navigation Aids**

 Any identified deficiencies in navigational facilities serving the airport will be fully addressed and recommendations will be made to alleviate the problem. Recommended Navigation Aids will be fully coordinated with the Federal Aviation Administration, and North Carolina Department of Transportation.

#### <u>Vehicular</u>

 Vehicular facility requirement estimates will be prepared utilizing the demand/capacity analysis and either establish or develop planning criteria. Requirements shall include roadway lanes per direct access route, public (short and long term) and employee parking, and rental car ready lots. Particular emphasis will be placed on public automobile facilities and circulation.

## **Excess Land Development**

 Lands not needed for aviation development will be considered for optional revenue producing activities such as industrial/business development. Key elements in considering the options will include access, utilities, environmental constraints, zoning, permitting, and market for various activity types.

<u>Task Product</u> - The Consultant will identify Facilities' needs for twenty years for airside, landside and terminal area of the Fayetteville Regional Airport as well as a determination of potential non-aviation use areas for revenue enhancement.

## TASK 6 - AIRPORT PLANS

Objective - The Consultant will prepare schematic layouts depicting facilities needs throughout the 20-year time frame.

When the revised forecasts and recommended facility requirements are determined, the Consultant will prepare alternative concepts and layouts for accommodating these facilities. The layouts will consider those options which are deemed to be prudent and reasonable and will be fully coordinated with all concerned.

The number of plans or drawings are to be included in this update are:

### A. Airport Layout Plan

- Review and update the existing Airport Layout Plan incorporating required facilities and optimizing airfield capacity and user convenience. Alternatives will be considered and the most prudent will be adjusted.

Included on the Airport Layout Plan (ALP):

- location and vicinity map
- data tables
- wind information
- runway protection zones
- staging of proposed development
- runway configuration
- taxiway configuration
- apron areas
- buildings
- automobile parking
- access roads
- navigation aids
- obstructions
- geometric dimensions

## B. Proposed Terminal Area and Access Plan

- The Consultant will prepare alternative Terminal Area and Access Plan concepts for review and analysis including evaluation of commuter service and air carrier service requirements. Following selection of a concept, terminal expansion schemes will be developed. Included will be the ingress and egress requirements and concepts of the functional needs of the terminal facility.

## C. Approach and Profile Plan

 The Consultant will prepare an Approach and Profile Plan which identified proposed approaches. Imaginary surfaces associated with the airport would be displayed as well as all obstructions to FAR Part 77 surfaces.

#### D. General Aviation Plan

- The Consultant will review and update existing plans for general aviation activities considering forecast facility requirements, the airfield and existing land use plans.

## E. Existing/Proposed Land Use Plan

 The Consultant will consider the recommended airport plan development relative to the near-airport environment. As appropriate, recommended changes to the existing Land Use Plan would be developed for areas on and adjacent to the airport. This plan would illustrate:

### Existing Use

- Zoning
- Adjacent usage
- Boundary

### Airside Requirements

- Terminal area
- Maintenance area
- Fixed Based Operations
- Reservation for future growth

#### Access

- Passenger access
- Parking
- Cargo access

### Noise Contours

- Ldn 65
- Ldn 60, if no 65 exists

## F. Cargo Area Plan

The Consultant will evaluate various schemes for cargo facilities expansion and prepare a layout of the most feasible alternative. Possible building facilities, land requirements, and groundside/airside access requirements will be depicted.

## G. Excess Land Use/Business Development Plan

 The Consultant will determine if any airport properties for business development opportunities which would enhance the airport's revenue potential. A concept for developing excess airport lands will be developed in this task.

<u>Task Product</u> - A set of schematic drawings conceptually illustrating the master plan and meeting FAA standards and requirements.

## TASK 7 - ENVIRONMENTAL OVERVIEW

Objective - The Consultant will provide an overview assessment of potential environmental impacts associated with the implementation of the proposed development at the airport.

An overview will be performed in accordance with FAA AC150/5070-6A "Airport Master Plan". This task will identify the environmental problems that potentially are to occur as a result of construction of proposed projects. Each of the following areas will be examined for determination of environmental impacts:

- noise:
- compatible land use:
- social impacts:
- socioeconomic impacts;
- air quality:
- water quality;
- DOT Act Section 4(f);
- historical, architectural, archaeological and cultural resources;
- biotic communities:
- endangered and threatened species;
- wetlands:
- floodplains:
- coastal zone management program;
- coastal barriers:
- wild and scenic rivers:
- prime and unique farmland:
- energy supply and natural resources;
- light emissions:
- solid waste impacts; and
- construction impacts.

<u>Task Product</u> - An environmental overview for the initial 5-year program as recommended by the Master Plan Report.

## TASK 8 - COST ESTIMATES AND STAGING

Objective - The Consultant will prepare costs and timing for 20 year facility requirements needs.

Construction cost estimates and schedules of development will be the product of this task. These schedules and cost estimates will be in 1992 dollars and geared towards concentrating detail in assessing the twenty year project period in five year increments.

A set of exhibits will be prepared depicting construction projects to be accomplished in each of the planning periods which will lead the orderly expansion of the airport from the existing layout, to those proposed in the various components of the update.

For each planning period the Consultant shall show:

- existing facilities to remain
- existing facilities to be demolished or modified
- new facilities

<u>Task Product</u> - Detailed order of magnitude cost estimate for the construction projects listed by planning periods in 1992 dollars will be prepared.

## TASK 9 - FINANCIAL AND ECONOMIC FEASIBILITY

Objective - The Consultant will provide financial and economic feasibility analysis for the proposed development plan.

The envisaged capital improvements program will require an increased level of capital investment and operating expenditures. Similarly, the implemented program components could generate additional revenues. As a result of, and because the recommended capital improvement programs must be reasonable, attainable, and make sense, the projects to upgrade and improve the Airport will be assessed financially and economically.

From a financial standpoint the capital, operating, and maintenance costs will be reviewed. Benefits to the airlines, airport, passengers, and potential cargo operators will be developed. Economic feasibility will address the savings to these groups in terms of delay reductions, time savings, convenience induced activity, and expanded services.

Task Product - A cost and benefit type analysis of the proposed development plan.

## TASK 10 - FINANCIAL AND IMPLEMENTATION PLAN

Objective - The Consultant will create a plan for the implementation of the proposed improvement projects.

The financial plan will include an implementation process that is feasible from a cost/economic benefit standpoint. Sources of governmental funding will be identified, and private sector participation will be assessed. The final plan will be formulated to provide:

- Scheduling of Capital Improvement Project
- Need and benefit of each project
- Cost of each project
- Funding source
- Cost flow projections
- Revenue projections

A marketing strategy will be included in the implementation plan to provide the airport with direction in aviation activity and service expansion possibilities, cargo opportunities, non-airport development potential, and funding strategies.

<u>Task Product</u> - A usable financing and implementation plan for development of the Airport.

### TASK 11 - REPORTS

Objective - The Consultant will provide project reports for the North Carolina Department of Transportation, the Federal Aviation Administration, and other agencies as required.

Once comments have been received from all participating agencies, a single volume draft report incorporating the summaries of work outputs in the Study will be prepared. All final comments and changes in the exhibits will be implemented as appropriate in the final publication.

### A. Interim Reports

- Draft reports will be furnished, at the completion of Task 4, Forecasts, which will include all elements up to that point; before the end of Task 6, Airport Plans, which will highlight the facility requirements and all alternatives and their evaluation; at the conclusion of Task 10, Financial Plan, which will be a single volume draft report incorporating summaries of all work tasks of this study and will include plan in full size format (as a separate attachment) as necessary. Special Technical memorandums covering the potential for new or expanded services, terminal development options, and business development opportunities will also be prepared and presented as appropriate.

## B. Final Report

A final report, suitably illustrated, will be printed and delivered with the final Airport Layout Plan sets of full-size drawings, which will incorporate revisions and suggestions, as appropriate from the reviewing agencies. An executive summary of the Master Plan report shall also be prepared.

Task Product - Document study procedures and provide a compendium of results.

# TASK 12 - STUDY ORGANIZATION/ADMINISTRATION/SCHEDULE

The final section of this Scope of Work includes the work items which, because of their nature, are inappropriate for inclusion elsewhere.

## A. Coordination

 The Consultant shall coordinate with required agencies included as a minimum, the Federal Aviation Administration and the North Carolina Department of Transportation, general citizenry, and major users/operators of the Airport.

## B. <u>Meetings</u>

- The Consultant will conduct meetings with the Airport as deemed appropriate and as requested by the Airport. For budgeting purposes, and based on the foregoing scope of services, a total of 5 meetings are scheduled. These could coincide with:
  - Activity Forecasts
  - Air Service Study
  - Airport Plan Alternatives
  - Financial/Implementation Plan



Mr. Lloyd stated that the Planning staff recommends approval of the initial zoning to R10 Residential District and C1 Local Business District based on the following:


1. The proposed initial zoning is similar to the previous County zoning.


Please find attached a draft of a plan to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). The salient points of the plan are as follows:

- 1. The services to the elderly and handicapped under ADA will be within the same service area as the fixed route system.
- 2. All fixed route buses will be equipped with wheelchair lifts as the current ones are replaced.
- 3. A paratransit system to provide door to door service must be created. The door to door service must be provided with 3/4 of a mile of the current bus routes.
- 4. The City of Fayetteville will be the certifying agency for approving ADA eligibility.

### **SECTION I**

### **INTRODUCTION:**

On September 6, 1991, the U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) published final regulations of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA). Included in these regulations was a requirement that public entities operating fixed route transportation service for the general public also provide complementary paratransit service to persons unable to use the fixed route system. The regulations also require that a plan for implementing complementary paratransit service be submitted by January 26, 1992 and service be in full compliance as soon as possible, but no later than January 26, 1997.

Following is the Fayetteville Area System of Transit's (FAST) Paratransit Plan of compliance with the ADA's regulations.

### SECTION II DESCRIPTION OF THE FIXED ROUTE SYSTEM

## HISTORICAL AND GEOGRAPHIC DESCRIPTION OF THE SERVICE AREA:

Cumberland County (Map B) played an role in North Carolina's history, having served as the state's capital during the General Assembly's 1789 ratification of the Constitution and the chartering of the University of North Carolina.

Fayetteville is a tale of two towns. Today's sixth largest municipality in North Carolina was created by combining two early trading settlements. The town of Campbellton, established in 1736 and located on the Cape Fear River, and the town of Cross Creek, established in 1765 and located at the site of two creeks crossing each other, merged in 1778 to become Upper and Lower Campbellton. In 1783, the town was renamed Fayetteville, in honor of the Marquis de LaFayette, the French

general who helped the colonies gain their independence from Great Britain.


There are two major communities that make-up Cumberland County. They are Hope Mills and Spring Lake. Hope Mills is located South of Fayetteville and is approximately seven miles away. Spring lake is ten miles west of Fayetteville.

Currently FAST has twenty (20) buses on eight (8) routes (Map A) operates 6 days a week and the hours of service are 5:30AM through 7:30PM. Sunday service is not provided. The number of vehicles operating on weekdays during peak hours is 12 (morning and evening). The number of vehicles in operation during nonpeak hours is ten (10).

During FY 90-91, approximately 535,574 vehicle miles of service were provided, and a total of 1,047,030 passengers were transported. FAST's fare structure is \$.60 regular fare, \$.25 for transfers, \$.30 elderly and handicapped,

\$5.40 for a 10-ride pass, \$24.00 monthly pass and an \$18.00 monthly student pass.

FAST has 6 (six) buses equipped with wheelchair lifts which equals 30% fleet accessibility. All of the buses kneel. 100% of the routes are accessible on an on call basis.

### **DEMOGRAPHIC DESCRIPTION**

Cumberland County experienced significant population growth between 1980 and 1990. The areas of Hope Mills and Spring Lake were the fastest growing areas. The population of Fayetteville increased approximately 27 percent between 1980 and 1990. Cumberland County's population for 1980 was 247,160 and is currently 274,566 for 1990 (Table 1.3).

The population in Cumberland County continues to increase, but the ethnic composition of the county remains steady. In 1980 the percent of White (non-Hispanic) individuals in Cumberland County was 64%, Black 30%, and Other race population 5%. The 1990 census figures for the same groups changed slightly. The percent of White (non-Hispanic) persons in Cumberland County for 1990 was 61%, Black 31%, and Other race populations 6%.

### **SECTION III**

## DESCRIPTION OF EXISTING PARATRANSIT SERVICES

### **INVENTORY OF PARATRANSIT SERVICES:**

In December of 1985 the Human Services Transportation System (HSTS) was started at FAST. HSTS provides transportation for the Senior Citizens, the handicapped and the economically disadvantaged. Services are provided to human service agencies on a contract basis. Currently services are provided to the Dept. of Social Services, Mental Health and Retardation, Cumberland County Coordination Council on Older Adults, Retired Senior Volunteer Program, Sickle Cell..., Handicapped Adults for Independent Living, Cumberland County Association of the Blind, the City of Fayetteville Parks and Recreation Dept. and Sugar and Spice Adult Daycare

Center.

Eligibility requirements vary with the agency being served. Each agency certifies the clients transported on its behalf.

The Human Service Transportation System operates Monday through Friday from 7:30AM until 6:00PM. Currently the system utilizes nine (9) vans and two (2), twenty-two (22) passenger buses. Six of the vehicles are wheelchair lift equipped.

During FY 90-91 HSTS provided 179,865 miles of service and transported 30,583 passengers.

### SURVEY OF EXISTING SERVICES

Other agencies providing paratransit in Cumberland County and the city of Fayetteville are taxicabs, Association for the Blind, South

Eastern Rehabilitation, Parks and Recreation, public schools, churches and group homes.

The Taxicabs contract with human service agencies such as DSS. The eligibility requirements are age and income. The city and county are serviced on an "on call" basis. The fare is paid by the contracting agency. There are no capacity constraints and the days and hours of operation are Monday through Friday from 7:30AM to 7:30PM.

The remaining agencies use vans and/or taxicabs to transport their clients. Some own their own vans while others contract with van owners.

### SECTION IV

### DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED COMPLEMENTARY SERVICE

The proposed complementary paratransit system will operate in the same areas of the duty as the fixed route system. Transportation provided by the paratransit system will be within the current city boundaries except in those areas where the fixed route system serves the county (See Map C).

It is anticipated that the paratransit fleet will be composed of one (1) 25-30ft lift equipped bus and two (2) 15 passenger lift equipped vans. The hours of operation would be from 5:45AM until 7:00PM Monday thru Saturday with no service on Sundays.

### **DEMAND RESPONSE**

Anyone who is certified as being ADA eligible can use the demand response system. Persons

who are considered ADA eligible fall within three categories. The first category of eligibility includes: "Any individual with a disability who is unable, as the result of a physical or mental impairment (including a vision impairment), and without the assistance of another individual (except the operator of a wheelchair lift or other boarding assistance device), to board, ride, or disembark from any vehicle on the system which is readily accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities." The second category of eligibility includes: "Any individual with a disability who needs the assistance of a wheelchair lift or other boarding assistance device and is able, with such assistance to board, ride, and disembark from any vehicle which is readily assessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities if the individual wants to travel on a route of the system during the hours of operation of the system at a time, or within a reasonable period of such time, when such a vehicle is not being used to provide designated public transportation on the route." The third category of eligibility


includes: "Any individual with a disability who has a specific impairment-related condition which prevents such individual from traveling to a boarding location or from a disembarking location on such system." A certified ADA eligible individual may use the demand response system by calling the operation center to request transportation. The ADA patron must give name, address, trip origin and destination and the time for pickup. Upon receiving this information a vehicle will be dispatched as soon as possible.

### **SUBSCRIPTION**

Any ADA eligible person that resides within the service area may also subscribe for transportation if the trip request is routine, i.e. doctor's appointment, routine shopping excursions, etc... This method would ensure the most percept service because it would give FAST an opportunity to plan a more expective route.

### ESTIMATE OF DEMAND

The demand for ADA eligible transportation was estimated using 1990 census information as base data. It was assumed that 5% of the population was ADA eligible (as per ADA handbook). With this in mind it was determined that 1,211 persons would be ADA eligible. 3,785 persons are disabled in the city of Fayetteville. ADA eligible individuals are estimated at 1.7%\* or 1,135 that fit categories 1 & 3. Individuals that are ADA eligible category 2 would be 7% of the total population (Table 1.4). \* ADA Paratransit Handbook

# DESCRIPTION OF PLANNED MODIFICATIONS TO THE EXISTING SYSTEM

Currently, there is not a paratransit system that provides door-to-door transportation to the elderly and handicapped. The door-to-door service provided is done so by a contractual arrangement with Human Service Agencies.

The current fixed route system is accessible only on the routes that have wheelchair lift equipped buses. There are currently six (6) of these buses in the fleet. The fleet is scheduled to be replaced over the next five (5) years. As the fleet is replaced each bus will be purchased with wheelchair lifts.

# DESCRIPTION OF HOW THE PROPOSED PARATRANSIT SERVICE WILL MEET THE SIX SERVICE CRITERIA

### SERVICE AREA

The service area for the proposed system will include all of the populated areas within 3/4 miles of an existing bus route (Map C). The system is configured in such a manner that most of the areas within the current boundaries are within the 3/4 mile standard and therefore will be included in the service area (Map B).

### **RESPONSE TIME**

Any request for service from an ADA eligible individual who resides within the service area will be accommodated within 24 hours of the request. Request for service will be received Monday thru Friday by operations personnel. On Sundays requests will be received by mechanical means. The hours that service will be requested will be from 7:00AM until 6:00PM

Monday thru Friday. Requests will not be received on Saturdays for next day service because the transit system does not operate on Sundays. Riders will be able to subscribe for transportation services at least 14 days in advance.

### **FARES**

The fare for the paratransit service is proposed to be \$1.20 per trip. This fare is twice the base fare for the increased level of transportation. A person without a disability can ride the fixed route system for \$.60.

### TRIP PURPOSE

The patrons that use the paratransit system will not be restricted by trip purpose nor will types of trips have priority over others.

### HOURS AND DAYS OF SERVICE

The paratransit system will operate the same hours and days as the fixed route system. The days of operation will be Monday thru Saturday. Service will start Monday thru Friday at 5:30AM and Saturdays 6:00AM. Service will end at 7:30PM Monday thru Saturday. There will be no service of any kind on Sundays.

### CAPACITY RESTRAINTS

Trips will be scheduled for pickup no more than one hour before the requested pickup time. Vehicles that are dispatched to a location for pickup can wait no more than 5 minutes. If demand dictates, additional vehicles and staff will be placed into service to meet the increased demand.

No shows would be defined as individuals who canceled trips less than ten (10) minutes before pickup. Three no shows within a two week

period could result in a suspension of transportation services to that individual.

#### TIMETABLE FOR IMPLEMENTATION

The following milestones will have to be implemented to be 100% compliance with the new ADA regulations:

### **SECTION V**

### ADA PARATRANSIT ELIGIBILITY STANDARDS

The following individuals are ADA paratransit eligible:

- 1. Individuals with a disability who can use an accessible vehicle, but the fixed route service they need to use is not accessible.
- 2. Individuals who, because of the nature of their disability, cannot use a fixed route system that is otherwise accessible.
- 3. Individuals with impairment-related conditions that prevent them from getting to or from a boarding or disembarking location.
- 4. Individuals who have been certified by another transit system as ADA eligible.
- 5. A person traveling as a companion of a

person who is ADA eligible is also eligible for that trip, not including Personal Care Attendants.

- A. The eligible individual and the companion must have the same destination.
- B. Personal Care Units are mobility aids. Mobility aids

are not covered under ADA. They will be eligible a

according to space availability.

C. Any additional individuals other than the companion will

be eligible according to space availability.

6. Individuals with a temporary disability which meet one or more of the five (5) categories previously stated.

7. Eligible individuals who do not reside in Cumberland County, but requesting service, will need to show eligibility certification. If no certification is submitted, the presumed eligible individual will be honored for 21 days.

### ADMINISTRATIVE APPEAL PROCESS

After the submission of a complete application (Table 1.5), FAST will notify the individual in writing of its decision concerning eligibility. If the decision is that the individual is ineligible, he written notice will state the reasons for the finding and the appeal process.

### THE APPEAL PROCESS

The applicant must first submit a written appeal to the committee appointed by City Council.

The committee, upon receipt of the appeal, will review the case and make recommendations to the City Manager.

The City Manager will have the final decision.

Written notice of the final decision will be sent to the applicant.





SUBJECT: Protest of Assessment; J. P. Riddle; Southland Drive

The following is a summary of the history of this case (an asterisk denotes a document that was in your January 6 agenda packet):

- 1. March 24, 1987 Notices of public hearing to consider the paving of Southland Drive sent to all affected property owners; notice was sent to J. P. Riddle, Post Office Box 53646, Fayetteville, North Carolina 28305;
- 2. March 31, 1987 Letter\* from J. P. Riddle indicating that he did not own any property on any streets in College Lakes;
- 3. April 6, 1987 Public hearing on preliminary resolution to approve the paving of Southland Drive; deed\* executed from Paul Thompson Development Corporation to the City of Fayetteville for a 1 foot strip abutting right-of-way on Southland Drive adjacent to Mr. Riddle's property;
- 4. April 8, 1987 Deed\* from Paul Thompson Development Corporation to the City of Fayetteville recorded;
- 5. May 12, 1989 City Council adopts resolution setting public hearing for June 5, 1989, to confirm assessment roll and the final costs for the paving of Southland Drive, along with six other assessment public hearings;
- 6. May 22, 1989 Notices sent to all affected property owners (39) on Southland Drive for the June 5, 1989, hearing; notice sent to J. P. Riddle, Post Office Box 53646, Fayetteville, North Carolina 28305;

- 7. June 5, 1989 Public hearing on Southland Drive continued to July 17, 1989, due to the fact that some property owners at the public hearing stated they were not benefitted by the improvement;
- 8. July 12, 1989 Notices sent to all affected property owners including Mr. Riddle indicating that the City would not be in a position to respond to the property owners claiming no benefit at the scheduled July 17, 1989, hearing and that the recommendation was going to be made that the hearing would be postponed until August 7, 1989;
- 9. <u>July 17, 1989</u> Public hearing continued to August 7, 1989;
- 10. August 7, 1989 Public hearing resumed on Southland Drive and the assessment roll was confirmed, with five lots having the assessment reduced.

The procedure for setting the public hearings and mailing followed in each and every case above. was The statutes require that the person designated to mail the notices shall file with the Council a certificate showing they were mailed by first-class mail on what date, and further recites that "such a certificate shall be conclusive as to compliance with the mailing provisions of this section in the absence (NCGS 160A-227). The original certificates are in a file in my office. One letter was returned, but it Mr. Riddle's. As you can see, there were actually two notices in 1989 regarding the public hearing to confirm the assessment roll.

When the public hearing was held in April of 1987, the title work to determine the owners for that hearing was done by the Engineering Department. After the paving was completed in 1989, the list of the property owners from the 1987 public hearing was given to my office, with Mr. Riddle shown as the owner of the property in question and no mention was made of the deed from Mr. Thompson. My office searched the records of the property owners from that time forward up to May when the notices were sent out. I was unaware of the deed from Mr. Thompson to the City for the 1 foot strip until this year when Mr. Riddle, through his attorney, challenged the assessment.

Based upon the foregoing, I requested an opinion from the Attorney General. My request dated January 9, 1992, and the response of the Attorney General dated January 28, 1992, are attached.

The address shown on the assessment roll for J. P. Riddle is his business mailing address. This is where all notices were After the assessment roll was confirmed, and the ledger cards were prepared in the Finance Department, one number was off the post office box address for Mr. Riddle. However, from the point in time the assessment roll confirmed, there was no further legal requirement to send any notices to property owners. We do this to make them aware of percent discount one more time to keep them from missing Because of this, it is possible that Mr. Riddle did not receive the follow-up letter advising him of the 30 percent discount. I did not discover this particular error in the assessment card address until I began writing Mr. Riddle in an effort to collect the assessment and got no response. However, is not the type of legal defect in the proceedings that would authorize you to set aside the entire assessment. issue occurred several years ago right after I became City Attorney. At that time I obtained an opinion from the Attorney General that ruled the City Council could not relieve the assessment.

reason this was placed upon your agenda Mr. Riddle, attorney, paid two years annual through his installments of the assessment under protest. Under statute, once the assessment roll is confirmed, they are "a lien on the property assessed of the same nature and to extent as the lien for county and city property taxes, . . . ". Thus, the provisions of GS 105-381 are invoked by payment of the assessment under protest. This statute gives you the authority to release the tax if it's (1) through clerical error, (2) an illegal tax, or (3) a tax levied for any illegal purpose. Any tax released in violation of this provision may be recovered from any member or members of the governing body who voted for the release, refund, or compromise by civil action instituted by any resident of the taxing unit (GS 105-380). It is this particular provision in the statute has caused me to be very strict in my recommendations to you concerning the release of any tax. In considering Mr. Riddle's request from the standpoint of a payment of a tax under protest, I cannot find where any of the three conditions exist to release the tax and therefore could not recommend it to you.

Please notice that the Attorney General's opinion is based upon the fact that we did not mislead Mr. Riddle in any way. Had I been aware of the deed I would have notified Mr. Riddle at the time. However, the Attorney General did not seem to find fault with this failure to notify Mr. Riddle. Therefore, in light of the Attorney General's opinion, and the requirements of GS 105-381, the only other alternative that I can see for Mr. Riddle is to seek a declaratory judgement in the courts.

Dear Mr. Murray:

In March of 1987 the City of Fayetteville sent notices to abutting property owners of a public hearing to take place pursuant to GS 160A-224, to consider the paving of a street. Upon receipt of this letter, Property Owner A wrote to the City that he did not own any land on the street. Property Owner B owned a 1 foot strip between Property Owner A and the street right-of-way. Property Owner B did not receive any notice the public hearing. At the public hearing the City approved the preliminary resolution pursuant to GS 160A-225. On the day of the public hearing, Property Owner B deeded to the City the 1 foot strip, thus making Property Owner A an abutting owner. the deed was not recorded until two days after the However, public hearing. Property Owner A was never notified by the fact that this deed was in existence and had been recorded. In 1989, after the paving project was complete, sent to the abutting property owners of the public notices were hearing to consider confirmation of the assessment to GS, 160A-227. pursuant Property Owner A was abutting owners notified. Due to two continuances of public hearing, all abutting property owners to include Property Owner A were notified of a second public hearing. Neither of the notices to Property Owner A in 1989 advised the deed from Property Owner B. All notices for both public hearings in 1987 and 1989 complied with the statute and the proceedings conducted by the City Council complied with the statute. Property Owner A did not appear at any At the time of the confirmation of the assessment in 1989, pursuant to GS 160A-232, payment by installment was approved. Recently, Property Owner A paid annual installments under protest, and requested relief upon

the basis that he received no benefit from the paving because he had several years ago recorded a covenant against access on the property to prohibit access from his property to the street that was paved. Property Owner A has requested that the City Council make a reassessment pursuant to GS 160A-231.

Based upon the foregoing facts, I would request your opinion as to whether or not there was any irregularity, omission, error, or lack of jurisdiction that would constitute authority for the City Council to make a reassessment pursuant to GS 160A-231.

If the answer to the foregoing is in the affirmative, I would request your opinion on another issue. GS 160A-228 makes an assessment a lien to the same extent as a lien for county and city property taxes after it is confirmed. Since Property Owner A made two payments under protest, I would assume that the provisions of GS 105-380 and GS 105-381 are invoked. If the City Council has the authority to make a reassessment, and it is determined that no benefit accrued to Property Owner A and therefore no assessment should be levied, does the City Council then have the authority to refund the two annual installments paid under protest, in light of GS 105-394?

If you should have any further questions, please do not hesitate to contact me. This matter has been scheduled for Council consideration on February 2, 1992, and your response prior to that time would be greatly appreciated.

The following is submitted in response to your letter dated January 9, 1992 regarding a special assessment under the provisions of Article 10 of Chapter 160A. For purposes of this response I have assumed two facts not expressly set out in your letter. The first fact is that the sole basis for the determination of the amount of the assessment was the amount of frontage on the street to be paved under the provisions of N.C.G.S. 160A-218(1) and the second fact is that the failure to notify Property Owner A of the deed from Property Owner B to the City did not involve any fraud or intentional effort to mislead Property Owner A.

It is the opinion of this office that there has been no "irregularity, omission, error or lack of jurisdiction" to support the City Council's setting aside of the assessment. only fact that is even unusual in the situation described in your letter is that Property Owner A received notice of the first public hearing when he was technically not entitled to such notice. In regard to all subsequent procedures Property Owner A received all appropriate notices and all statutory requirements were met. From the statement of the facts set out in your letter, two years elapsed between the time that Property Owner A received the notice of the public hearing in 1987 and the subsequent notice in 1989. Given the nature of the property owned by Property Owner B, i.e. a one foot strip, Property Owner A could hardly rely on an assumption that Property Owner B would not transfer that property. In any event, the recording of the deed from Property Owner B to the City very clearly gave Property Owner A record notice that he was now an abutting property owner, and if in fact he had no actual knowledge of his status it was because of an unreasonable reliance on an unwarranted and false assumption that Property Owner B continued to own the one foot strip.

The presumption in favor of regularity afforded the assessment of liens for the paving of streets also supports a conclusion that a reassessment under N.C.G.S. § 160A-231 is not appropriate.

Furthermore, there is a presumption in favor of the regularity of a proceeding under which public improvements, authorized by the General Assembly, have been made. Gallimore v. Thomasville, 191 N. C., 648, 132 S.E., 657, and the assessment roll is prima face evidence of a valid assessment and of the regularity and correctness of all prior proceedings. Anderson v. Albemarle, 182
N. C., 434, 109 S.E., 262; McQuillen, Mun. Corp., sec. 2117. In the absence of any showing to the contrary assessments are presumed valid and he who attacks their validity had the burden of establishing the contrary. Justice v. Asheville, 161 N. C., 62, 76 S.E., 822 Anderson v. Albemarle, supra.

Because the answer to the first question is in the negative I will not respond to the second issue in your letter regarding N.C.G.S. §§ 105-380, 105-381 and 105-394.

#### CASE NOTES

Editor's Note. — Redevelopment Comm'n v. Guilford County, 274 N.C. 585, 164 S.E.2d 476 (1968), cited below, was decided under former provisions similar to subsection (a) of this section.

When Injunction Will Lie. — Injunction will lie when the tax or assessment is itself invalid or illegal. Redevelopment Comm'n v. Guilford County, 274 N.C. 585, 164 S.E.2d 476 (1968).

# § 105-380. No taxes to be released, refunded, or compromised.

(a) The governing body of a taxing unit is prohibited from releasing, refunding, or compromising all or any portion of the taxes levied against any property within its jurisdiction except as expressly provided in this Subspaces.

pressly provided in this Subchapter.

(b) Taxes that have been released, refunded, or compromised in violation of this section shall be deemed to be unpaid and shall be collectible by any means provided by this Subchapter, and the existence and priority of any tax lien on property shall not be affected by the unauthorized release, refund, or compromise of the tax liability.

(c) Any tax that has been released, refunded, or compromised in violation of this section may be recovered from any member or members of the governing body who voted for the release, refund, or compromise by civil action instituted by any resident of the taxing unit, and when collected, the recovered tax shall be paid to the treasurer of the taxing unit. The costs of bringing the action, including reasonable attorneys' fees, shall be allowed the plaintiff in the event the tax is recovered.

(d) The provisions of this section are not intended to restrict or abrogate the powers of a board of equalization and review or any agency exercising the powers of such a board. (1901, c. 558, s. 31; Rev., s. 2854; C.S., s. 7976; 1971, c. 806, s. 1; 1973, c. 564, s. 2.)

#### CASE NOTES

Duty of Commissioners to Rescind Order Releasing Tax. — It is not only competent, but the duty of county commissioners to rescind an order improvidently granted to release one from the assessment of a legal tax upon property. Lemly v. Commissioners of Forsyth, 85 N.C. 379 (1881) (decided under former similar provisions).

### § 105-381. Taxpayer's remedies.

(a) Statement of Defense. — Any taxpayer asserting a valid defense to the enforcement of the collection of a tax assessed upon his property shall proceed as hereinafter provided.

(1) For the purpose of this subsection, a valid defense shall include the following:

a. A tax imposed through clerical error;

b. An illegal tax;

c. A tax levied for an illegal purpose.

(2) If a tax has not been paid, the taxpayer may make a demand for the release of the tax claim by submitting to the governing body of the taxing unit a written statement of his defense to payment or enforcment of the tax and a request for release of the tax at any time prior to payment of the tax.

(3) If a tax has been paid, the taxpayer, at any time within five years after said tax first became due or within six months from the date of payment of such tax, whichever is the later date, may make a demand for a refund of the tax paid by submitting to the governing body of the taxing unit a written statement of his defense and a request for refund

(b) Action of Governing Body. — Upon receiving a taxpayer's written statement of defense and request for release or refund, the governing body of the taxing unit shall within 90 days after receipt of such request determine whether the taxpayer has a valid defense to the tax imposed or any part thereof and shall either release or refund that portion of the amount that is determined to be in excess of the correct tax liability or notify the taxpayer in writing that no release or refund will be made. The governing body may, by resolution, delegate its authority to determine requests for a release or refund of tax of less than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) to the finance officer, manager, or attorney of the taxing unit. A finance officer, manager, or attorney to whom this authority is delegated shall monthly report to the governing body the actions taken by him on requests for release or refund. All actions taken by the governing body or finance officer, manager, or attorney on requests for release or refund shall be recorded in the minutes of the governing body. If a release is granted or refund made, the tax collector shall be credited with the amount released or refunded in his annual settlement.

(c) Suit for Recovery of Property Taxes. (1) Request for Release before Payment. — If within 90 days after receiving a taxpayer's request for release of an unpaid tax claim under (a) above, the governing body of the taxing unit has failed to grant the release, has notified the taxpayer that no release will be granted, or has taken no action on the request, the taxpayer shall pay the tax. He may then within three years from the date of payment bring a civil action against the taxing unit for the amount

(2) Request for Refund. — If within 90 days after receiving a taxpayer's request for refund under (a) above, the governing body has failed to refund the full amount requested by the taxpayer, has notified the taxpayer that no refund will be made, or has taken no action on the request, the taxpayer may bring a civil action against the taxing unit for the amount claimed. Such action may be brought at any time within three years from the expiration of the period

in which the governing body is required to act.

(d) Civil Actions. — Civil actions brought pursuant to subsection (c) above shall be brought in the appropriate division of the general court of justice of the county in which the taxing unit is located. If, upon the trial, it is determined that the tax or any part of it was illegal or levied for an illegal purpose, or excessive as the result of a clerical error, judgment shall be rendered therefor with interest thereon at six percent (6%) per annum, plus costs, and the judgment shall be collected as in other civil actions. (1901, c. 558, s. 30; Rev., s. 2855; C. S., s. 7979; 1971, c. 806, s. 1; 1973, c. 564, s. 3; 1977, c. 946, s. 2; 1985, c. 150, s. 1; 1987, c. 127.) 110

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

Drug Task Force Recommendations

The recommendations of the Task Force are all worthy of implementation. The recommendations are well thought out and are somewhat interrelated. The intent of the Task Force was to make general recommendations and leave specific implementation strategy up to the City.

We were not prepared at your meeting Monday to propose specific implementation strategies or to suggest priorities. The City should have a very specific plan of action which sets priorities, establishes clear objectives, and identifies sources of current and future funding. The problems we are attempting to solve will not be solved overnight. There are no quick fixes, and there are certainly not unlimited resources.

While it is imperative that the City begin the process, it is just as imperative that we take a long-term approach, and at the same time try to ensure that scarce resources are wisely used. The Task Force has provided the outline. Our job is now to carefully and thoughtfully fill in the details.

The Task Force recognized that the City is already carrying out successful programs. It has recommended expanding those programs it feels are the most likely to succeed in dealing with the problems. As a first step in implementing the recommendations, I propose the following:

1. Begin implementation of recommendation number thirteen (13) by filling the vacancy in the position of Community Relations Specialist. This position was frozen as part of our 3 percent work force reduction. This position would be augmented with another position or perhaps two in fiscal year 1992-93. The existing vacancy can be filled in two to three weeks if

approved. Other positions if approved in the 92-93 budget can be filled by the end of July. This person would be assigned the task of organizing target neighborhoods and seeking involvement of businesses and places of worship. The ultimate operating cost of \$72,525 can be thus phased in, giving the City time to identify the funding source or program cuts needed to support the program on a continuing basis. A significant amount of time is spent by people in this section maintaining records on our current burglar alarm ordinance. We will be submitting to you a revised ordinance in the near future that could free up this time for community work.

- 2. Implement recommendation number nine (9) and seek matching funding from Cumberland County Schools.
- 3. Implement recommendation number two (2) by reserving \$250,000 from current fund balances as a reserve fund for matching federal grants. President Bush has announced his 12 billion dollar anti-drug program which includes grant funds to local programs. The Task Force report can be an excellent tool for use in grant applications. In this way we can stretch local dollars and hopefully cover much of the start-up cost for implementing the remainder of the recommendations. Continuation funding can be addressed in the FY 92-93 budget.

If these recommendations are to be implemented, the Council must face the hard decisions of how to fund these programs not only this year but also next year and thereafter. Either additional revenue has to be raised or cuts made in other services. Each of the Task Force recommendations needs to be analyzed in terms of its impact on other services. Adding more police officers in the neighborhoods may require additional investigative and clerical staff for support. Transferring officers from one program to another has its consequences. Our concentration on traffic enforcement was successful in reducing traffic deaths and property damage. As we have moved officers from traffic to street crimes, we are seeing the trend in traffic deaths, injuries and property damage start up again. Balancing priorities in services and programs requires careful consideration.

SUBJECT: Mayor's Task Force on Drugs in our Community

I have reviewed the recommendations of the Mayor's Task Force and attempted to analyze those recommendations that pertain totally or in part to the Police Department.

#### RECOMMENDATION 1:

We recommend that City Council acknowledge that street-level drug dealing and purchasing is a crisis, and that it work toward adoption of a crisis management plan by researching the practicality of implementing a curfew and/or other local ordinances designed to aid police in street-level drug enforcement.

#### **RESPONSE:**

If the City elects to implement a curfew, additional resources will be needed to address that mandate. Dependent upon the thrust of the curfew, the expectations of City Council and your office, a cost projection would be made. It should suffice to say that if a curfew or even a Parental Responsibility Ordinance is implemented citizens expectations will require enforcement, current resources do not provide for that effort.

#### **RECOMMENDATION 7:**

We recommend that City Council act favorably upon the recommendation of the Chief of Police to expand neighborhood based foot and mounted patrols in high risk areas.

#### RESPONSE:

As I have often indicated, Neighborhood Foot Patrols are an effective method of policing high crime areas. Mounted Neighborhood Patrols are extremely effective. My reaction is that we should establish at least three more walking or mounted beats, that effort should be flexible enough so that the officers can be moved to other areas once the neighborhood crime problems are displaced. The movement of neighborhood officers from their established turf is not a recommended strategy as neighborhoods tend to become possessive of their beat officers. However, when I consider cost, it appears more feasible to recommend three officers and three mounts be added to our authorized strength and then assign the officers to various neighborhoods with or without horses and in some instances on bicycle patrol.

#### RECOMMENDATION 8:

We recommend that City Council work cooperatively with the Fayetteville Metropolitan Housing Authority to establish police substations within Housing Authority properties and that City Council buy a type of Recreational Vehicle (RV) to serve as a mobile police substation. This police substation would be located in various areas of the City as needed.

#### **RESPONSE:**

We have had the idea of a roving police substation for some time as it will address the needs of our neighborhoods as well as the Cross Creek Mall area during the Christmas season. This substation can either be a motorized vehicle similar to a large motor home or a large trailer towed by a truck. Either design has the same basic function, that of a public service counter with the availability of a non-sworn clerk to take reports, an area for an officer to interview suspects or complainants and if necessary an office for a magistrate. The unit can also be used at traffic check points and for DWI campaigns. We have applied for a grant, however, that effort is doubtful due to the current availability of federal grant funds.

#### RECOMMENDATION 9:

We recommend that City Council direct the Chief of Police to expand drug education programs taught by law enforcement officers in city middle/junior high schools and special schools, and that cooperative efforts between the police and city schools be expanded.

#### RESPONSE:

It is apparent that we should increase our School Resource Program by two officers. One to be assigned to Hill Crest the other to Reid Ross. This assignment would create the necessary linkage between the D.A.R.E. Program offered in Grade 6 and the students in Grades 7, 8 & 9 prior to their movement to high school.

Our current D.A.R.E. officer (one full time) teaches the D.A.R.E. curriculum in fourteen schools. Obviously we need another officer assigned to D.A.R.E. to reduce the teaching burden and allow for more student/officer interaction.

#### RECOMMENDATION 13:


We recommend that City Council have the Police Department expand Neighborhood Watch Programs beyond residential members only, and to include businesses, industry and places of worship, and to actively seek their involvement.

#### **RESPONSE:**

Our Crime Prevention Specialist is doing a superb job but simply cannot keep up with the demand for services. Our Specialist is not only burdened with managing our substandard alarm ordinance but has had to assume part of the duties of our Community Relations Specialist since that position was frozen this budget year. We desparately need relief in this area. I suggest that we fill the Community Relations Specialist position and create another position to share the job responsibilities of both positions. The alarm ordinance deficiencies should be immediately addressed to relieve that burden, that effort alone would create a more cost effective alarm response and reduce the workload for both Specialists.



SUBJECT: Agenda Item - Annexation Petition - The Greens, Section 1, Part 1

CONTENT/BACKGROUND: The Greens is an existing residential area located north of Country Club Drive, west of Ramsey Street. (See Map A.) The Greens is being developed by the Broadwell Land Company. The original part of The Greens (which is already developed) was annexed (by petition) in 1983.

On November 26, 1991, the City received an annexation petition from Broadwell Land Company requesting that a 7.31 acre tract adjacent to The Greens be annexed. The petition was signed by Dohn Broadwell, President, Broadwell Land This tract is to be developed as a new section of The Greens. It is known as Section 1, Part 1.

LOCATION: The proposed annexation area is located north of and adjacent to the original part of The Greens. The area is also located to the rear of (west of) the North Gate Shopping Center. (See Map A and Map B.)

REASON FOR THE PETITION: The owner of the property proposes to develop the property as residential. Since neither water nor sewer are available, water and sewer main extensions will be needed.

There is a policy which states that property owners/developers requesting water and sanitary sewer extensions to areas immediately adjacent or contiguous to the City must file a petition for annexation as a prerequisite to utility extensions. The City Council has the freedom to approve or reject the petition. Pursuant to this policy, the owner has submitted a petition.

The petition was presented to City Council on January 6, 1992. The City Council adopted a resolution directing the City Clerk to investigate the







CONTEXT/BACKGROUND: On August 26, 1991, the City received an annexation petition. The petition was signed by Mark Stephen Norton. The petition requested annexation of property (1.12 acres) which is the current site of Norton's Wrecker Service.

LOCATION: The property is located at the intersection of West Mountain Drive and Sandy Valley Road. (See Map A and Map B.) The street address of Norton's Wrecker Service is 412 West Mountain Drive.

REASON FOR THE PETITION: Mr. Norton states that he would like for the property to be annexed so that the wrecker service can be added to the City's wrecker service rotation list. In order for a wrecker service to be on the City's wrecker service rotation list, it needs to be located within the City. Norton's Wrecker Service was formerly located within the City (at 2200 Southern Avenue). However, the wrecker service was moved to the site at 412 West Mountain Drive about a year ago. This site is outside the City.

REASON THAT A SATELLITE PETITION WAS SUBMITTED - As shown on Maps A and B, the petition area does not abut directly on the municipal boundaries (i.e., the primary corporate limits). Therefore, Mr. Norton has submitted a petition requesting satellite annexation.

The petition was presented to City Council on January 6, 1992. The City Council adopted a resolution directing the City Clerk to investigate the sufficiency of the petition. The sufficiency of the petition has been checked. The next step is for the City Council to fix a date for a public hearing.







WHEREAS, on December 19, 1985, the City Council of the City of Fayetteville by Resolution Number R1985-119 (as amended) established six electoral districts as required by Section 4.2 of the City Charter;

AND WHEREAS, on September 16, 1991, the City Council of the City of Fayetteville by Resolution Number R1991-080 revised the electoral district boundaries for the purpose of correcting population imbalances among the districts as shown by the 1990 federal census;

AND WHEREAS, the electoral district boundaries, which were revised on September 16, 1991, by Resolution Number R1991-080, were based on the 1990 census boundaries of the City of Fayetteville, plus all territory annexed in annexations 90-2-324 through 90-11-338;

AND WHEREAS, on September 23, 1991, the City Council of the City of Fayetteville by Resolution Number R1991-081 revised the electoral district boundaries for the purpose of accounting for territory annexed to the City in Annexation Ordinance Numbers 91-4-339 through 91-7-347;

AND WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Fayetteville has by Annexation Ordinance Number 91-11-348 annexed the territory described in that annexation ordinance to the City of Fayetteville;

AND WHEREAS, N.C.G.S. 160A-23 authorizes the City Council to revise electoral district boundaries from time to time for the purpose of accounting for territory annexed to the City;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Fayetteville, North Carolina, that:

Section 1. By virtue of the authority granted by N.C.G.S. 160A-23, the electoral district boundaries of the City of Fayetteville are hereby revised as follows:

(1) By adding to District 6 the territory described in Annexation Ordinance No. 91-11-348. (Roxie Avenue - Boone Trail Area)


Section 2. The above stated revision to the electoral district boundaries of the City will not be effective until:

- (1) The City of Fayetteville submits the foregoing revision to the electoral district boundaries to the U.S. Department of Justice, and the U.S. Department of Justice preclears the same; and
- (2) The City of Fayetteville submits Annexation Ordinance Number 91-11-348 to the U.S. Department of Justice, and the U.S. Department of Justice preclears the annexation.

Section 3. After this revision to the electoral district boundaries of the City of Fayetteville and Annexation Ordinance Number 91-11-348 has been precleared by the U.S. Department of Justice, the staff of the City Engineering Department will revise the boundaries of the City's electoral districts.

Section 4. That pursuant to N.C.G.S. 160A-23(a), the boundaries of the City's electoral districts are shown on the

Larry R. Godwin for a Special Use Permit)

A public hearing (Item 3-B) was held on January 21, 1992, concerning the above-referenced case. A map (Map A attached) was included in the agenda material for the case, and a slide of this map was presented at the public hearing. In response to the boundaries shown on the map, City Councilmembers expressed concern over whether the City failed to follow Mr. Godwin's property line when the City annexed the area. You asked me to look into this situation.

The purpose of this memo is to report my findings and opinions regarding this situation. In looking into this situation, I have talked with staff members of the Engineering Department, Inspections Department, and Joint Planning Board. I have also spoken with Mr. Cogswell, and I have contacted Mr. Godwin.

Background - This case involves the property which was annexed into the City as Larry's Sausage Company. The property is owned by Larry R. Godwin. The area was annexed by petition. Mr. Godwin submitted a petition pursuant to the PWC contiguous area - utility extension policy. The area was annexed on May 6, 1991; the annexation was effective on June 30, 1991. After annexation, the area was initially zoned as M-2 in the City. Because of the nature of the business (abattoir), Mr. Godwin had to apply for a Special Use Permit.

Based on my research, I do not believe that the City failed to follow Mr. Godwin's property line when the City annexed the area. This belief is based on two reasons.

The first reason is that the boundaries of the annexation were based on legal descriptions contained in deeds provided by Mr. Godwin. Mr. Godwin provided

deeds when he petitioned for annexation. In preparing the legal description for the annexation, the City Engineering Department staff used the legal descriptions contained in these deeds.


The second reason is that at the time of annexation the northern boundary line of the Special Use Permit site had not been delineated. This northern boundary line was delineated after annexation due to the following factors:

- a. Mr. Godwin plans to make an addition to the rear of the existing building.
- b. The rear of the proposed addition is very close to the Fayetteville City Limit Line. (See Map A.) (However, it is not in violation of the City's M-2 zoning district set-back requirements.)
- c. Even though the proposed addition is not in violation of City M-2 set-back requirements, Mr. Godwin wants to provide more separation between the rear of the proposed addition and the rear of the project site. Providing more separation will mean that there will be adequate area for loading and unloading.
- d. In order to provide more separation, Mr. Godwin asked his engineers (Moormen-Kizer) to delineate a new boundary for the project site. This newly delineated boundary became the northern side of the project site. (See Map A.) This new boundary was created on land owned by Mr. Godwin.
- e. The delineation of the new boundary created the "area in county" on Map A.

In conclusion, Map A certainly creates the impression that the City failed to follow Mr. Godwin's property line when the City annexed the area. However, based on the two reasons outlined above, I do not believe that this mistake occurred.



The Fayetteville Police Department utilized six K-9 teams throughout the 1991 year. One K-9 team is assigned to each of the five Patrol Division squads and there is a K-9 team either on duty or on-call 24 hours a day.

Through the K-9's ability to track/trail from crime scenes, escape routes of suspects were located and in some instances, tracks/trails led investigators to the suspects' residence.

In 1991, four of the patrol K-9s were certified in scent discrimination.

During 1991, K-9 teams were used for 726 calls for service and performed one or more of the special abilities that they are trained for in 666 of these calls.

The K-9 teams were present during many arrests, but the arrests which can be directly attributed to the use of K-9 teams amounted to 25 misdemeanor arrests involving trespassing, narcotics violations, traffic violations, and assault suspect.

There were 88 felony arrests which involved breaking and entering and larceny, narcotics violations, robbery, homicides, criminal assaults and other dangerous weapon assaults.

The K-9 teams are credited for the recovery of stolen monies and property in the amount of \$10,323.00.

The dollar amount of controlled substances (narcotics) located by the K-9 teams had a street value of approximately \$101,990.00 and included Marijuana, Heroin, Cocaine, and Crack-Cocaine.

Our K-9 team assisted outside agencies such as the Cumberland County Sheriff's Department, City-County Bureau of Narcotics, Spring Lake Police Department, Harnett County Sheriff's Department, State Highway Patrol, Stanly County Sheriff's Department, Wilson County Sheriff's Department, Brunswick County Sheriff's Department, Hope Mills Police Department and St. Pauls Police Department for a total of 29 calls for service.
